Civilisations Sources and evidence</p> <p>We know that sources and evidence help us to find out about the past. Sources and evidence</p> <p>The gates at the front of Worden park and the buildings, maze, walled garden are centuries old (see photos on archives) Civilisations Sources and evidence</p> <p>The original St Andrews building is now the nursery. Civilisations Sources and evidence</p> <p>Worden Park was owned by the Farington family for 400 years. It was opened to the public in 1951. Civilisations Sources and evidence</p> <p>Extended Knowledge The original St. Andrew's Infant School (now used as a nursery) was built in 1837. It is stone with a slate roof and is in Jacobean style. It is a Grade II listed building. The nursery was built in 1837. The current building that is St. Andrew's Infant School was opened in 1993.</p>

		<p>In 1951 the hall was bought by Leyland Council who opened the grounds as a park for the public.</p> <p>Significant event – A devastating fire struck the house in 1941, severely damaging many of the new parts of the hall and leaving it a burnt-out shell.</p>
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
